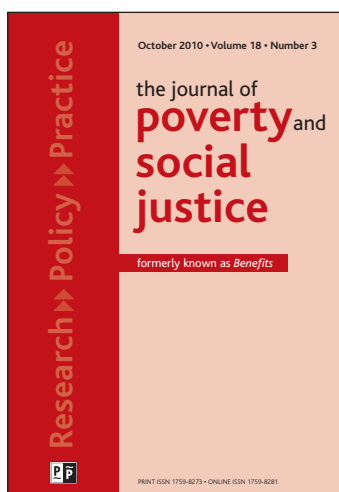

Call for papers

Longer or shorter papers may be accepted by arrangement with the Editorial Board. An abstract of not more than 100 words should be included. All articles are refereed to assess their suitability for publication.

Authors are encouraged to submit electronic copy but paper copies are also accepted. Electronic copies should be sent as an attached file in Word, text or rich text format. For both electronic and hard copies, articles should be anonymised, ready for sending to referees and be accompanied by an email address or note giving full contact details of the author(s) and, in the case of jointly authored articles, nominating an author for correspondence.
