

## **POLICY & POLITICS ANNUAL LECTURES**

The *Policy & Politics* Annual Lecture was established in 1996 to enhance further the international profile of the journal. This was achieved by inviting eminent speakers to address broad-ranging themes such as 'Globalisation and foreign policy' (Dame Pauline Neville-Jones, 1999), 'The UN and peace: does it help?' (Sir Marrack Goulding, 2000) and 'Western intelligence, Osama bin Laden and international terrorism' (Professor Christopher Andrew, 2002). As a public lecture offered by the University of Bristol, a separate objective was to provide an opportunity for the citizens of Bristol to hear experts reflect on topics of major contemporary significance. Over the years, the audience has included politicians and senior officers from the City Council (including the Lord Mayor), representatives from the business community and the voluntary sector, and groups of young people from secondary schools and sixth form colleges. The Annual Lecture has thus played a part in the University's widening participation strategy. The Management Board of the journal is committed to continuing what has now become a Bristol University tradition.
